- The Spanish cognate of **dairy** is diario.



“Dragon Gets By”




One way a story unfolds is that one action or event causes something else to happen.

Problem Solving
“Dragon Gets By”




Most stories start with a problem and then tell what happens as characters try to solve the problem.

An author may make the story more interesting by having the characters run into further problems as they try to solve the first one.

- Explain how Dragon’s shopping leads to his next two problems.

Motion in Art
“Dragon Gets By”




- Illustrators can make us “see” motion by the way they position people and objects.
- Sometimes the changes from one illustration to the next let us know that things are moving.

As you look at the illustrations on pages 30-31:

- point out objects in positions that show they are in motion.
- look for motion clues in changes from one illustration to the next.

Cross-Curricular Connection
“Dragon Gets By”




- Could excitement really make Dragon hungry?
- In a way, yes!
- When you are excited or afraid you use up nutrients in your blood faster.

- When your brain receives the message that you do not have enough nutrients in your blood, it signals the stomach.
- The stomach muscles cramp and that is what makes you feel hungry.

 - who the story is about
 - where the story takes place
 - what happens at the beginning, middle, and end of the story
